A LETTER FROM ISO:

Many individuals of the LSUHSC community felt the fear of the potential consequences of implementing the SEVP Fall 2020 Guidance that was released on July 6, 2020. In reaction, the LSU Interim President Tom Galligan poignantly expressed to international students that "you are part of the LSU Tiger family, and we are advocating for you." The LSU system was ready to make any reasonable accommodations to ensure the guidelines do not adversely affect international students. Further, many LSUHSC faculty and staff denounced the federal guidance in solidarity with international students. They understood the difficult position they will find themselves in, all amid the COVID-19 pandemic still looming among us.

The July 6 guidance has was ultimately rescinded thanks to the advocacy of pro-immigrant organizations and higher education institutions. Current guidance permits international students in the US to take online, hybrid, or inperson classes in compliance with F-1 regulations for Fall 2020.

In this bi-weekly newsletter, LSUHSC ISO wishes to do our part in advocating for our international community. In this issue, we want to emphasize the value of international students and scholars on our campus and inform our readers of some beneficial community resources and support organizations on campus.





STATUS OF OUR METRO AREA

- Louisiana is currently in Phase 2 of reopening until August 7th as COVID-19 cases surpass 100,000.

LSUHSC:

- If you have a Covid-19-related absence, you may now once again use Special Leave first before exhausting all other leave. This Special Leave, which we authorized July 23, is an additional allotment of 14 days leave for a Covid-19-related illness for any employee, or 15 days leave for a Covid-19related illness for a health care worker or emergency responder. While we anticipate an extension, this Special Leave is currently set to expire Sept 4, 2020, and it cannot be guaranteed beyond that at this time.
- Remote work model is in effect since 7/27/2020 for two weeks for all those who have the ability to work from home. Please inquire with your direct supervisor regarding this matter
- LSU Healthcare Network Campus Multispecialty Clinic Building at 478 South Johnson Street is offering COVID-19 antibody testing for the LSUHSC community. To register and request an appointment, you will need to log onto our intranet to the COVID-19 Testing Portal at this link: <u>https://intranet.lsuhsc.edu/covidtesting/</u>.
- In regards to returning to LSUHSC campus post international travel, LSUHSC will adhere to current CDC guidelines requiring that all international travelers quarantine for 14-days upon their arrival to the US.
- <u>Per US immigration guidance</u>, **new** international students are <u>barred from all-online classes</u>. ISO will follow-up individually with any student affected by this guidance.

City & Country of Birth: Thessaloniki, Greece

Phaethon was born in Thessaloniki, Greece, but has lived most of his life in the United States. His mother is Greek, and his father is American. Both sides of his family have histories and cultural practices deeply rooted in the traditions of their home countries. His father comes from a long lineage of farmers who have grown corn and soy in Ohio for generations. His mother comes from Amyntaio, one of the most well-known wine regions of Greece. His parents are very proud of their backgrounds and have made sure to incorporate their cultures and family traditions into all aspects of Phaethon's upbringing.

Education's importance is one value his parents share, and they emphasized that from an early age. In high school, the immune system became a significant curiosity to him, and Phaethon spent much of his senior year trying to understand the complex system. During his undergraduate schooling in Boston, MA, he studied immunology in greater depth and honed his understanding of immunotherapy and medical applications of immunology. After college, he worked as a researcher and studied the effects of oxygenation n immune stimulation. These experiences ultimately led him to New Orleans, where he continued his study of both clinical medicine and immunology research as an MD/Ph.D. candidate. He is currently in the third year of his Ph.D. The goal of his project is to develop an immune cell-targeted whole-cell tumor vaccine to treat colorectal cancers.

Ultimately, he hopes to graduate from medical school and residency to become an academic physician-scientist and continue his research of the immune system and immunotherapies. His personal goal will always be to visit Greece each summer, spend time with his relatives by the sea, and give his family home a fresh coat of traditional blue and white paint.
